George Hagman will present a comprehensive reconsideration of psychoanalytic mourning theory, the subject of his new book. After reviewing several psychoanalytic models on mourning, Mr. Hagman will discuss his own experiences of bereavement and how, as part of his recovery from these devastating losses, he was led to challenge and revise many aspects of what he calls the Standard Model of Mourning that psychoanalysis has promoted for the past 100 years. In the second half of his presentation Mr. Hagman will lay out the framework for his New Mourning theory, which emphasizes the relational context of bereavement, diversity within the mourning process, and the complex and enduring attachment that the survivor establishes with the deceased. Mr. Hagman will discuss the treatment and clinical implications for his reconceptualization of the mourning process, followed by group discussion.



George Hagman, LCSW is a clinical social worker and psychoanalyst in private practice in New York City and Stamford, Connecticut. He is on the faculty of the Training and Research Institute for Self-Psychology, and the Westchester Center for the Study of Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy and a member of the continuing education faculty at the Western New England Psychoanalytic Institute in New Haven. He is the author of “Aesthetic Experience: Beauty, Creativity and the Search for the Ideal”, “The Artist’s Mind: Psychoanalytic Perspectives on Art, Modern Artists and Modern Art”, “Creative Analysis: Art, Creativity and Clinical Process” and “New Models of Bereavement Theory and Treatment: New Mourning”. His most recent book is: “Art, Creativity and Psychoanalysis: Perspectives from Analyst-Artists.”

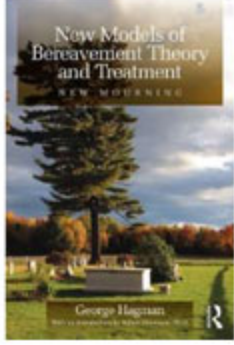
